



The USS LAFFEY (DD-724) was commissioned at Boston Navy Yard on 8 February 1944. After a short shakedown cruise, she was sent in a convoy escort group to England in May of 1944, where she participated in the Normandy Invasion on D-Day.

September, 1944, found the LAFFEY in the Pacific running convoy escort, and in the following months of that year, she rescued fliers from the sea, picked up downed Japanese pilots, and bombarded beaches prior to invasions.

From 12 to 17 December, 1944, the ship participated in the operations in connection with the landing of troops on Mindoro, serving as fighter director ship throughout this period. In January of 1945, Lingayan Gulf was the target of our forces in the Pacific, and the LAFFEY also saw action in the campaign.

Thirty miles north of Okinawa, on 16 April 1945, the LAFFEY was attacked repeatedly by approximately 50 Jap aircraft. After splashing nine of the Kamikaze aircraft unassisted, the ship sustained severe injuries, including 4 bomb hits, 5 kamikaze hits, and grazing blows by 3 more Nip aircraft. Personnel casualties totaled 103, with 32 killed or missing.

After extensive overhaul and repairs in Seattle, the LAFFEY reported for duty in Com-DesPac and later participated in the first Bikini atom bomb tests


The LAFFEY was de-commissioned at San Diego on 30 June 1947. She was re-commissioned 26 January 1951, and after extensive overhaul in Portsmouth Navy Yard, Norfolk, Virginia, took part in the Atlantic Fleet Maneuvers of October 1951.

On 22 January 1952, the LAFFEY departed from Norfolk, Va., via the Panama Canal, on her first around-the-world cruise. Reporting for duty with Task Force 77 on 5 March 1952, the LAFFEY joined in the blockade and bombardment of the Korean coast. Operating in heavily mined Wonsan Harbor for 29 continuous days during April and May of 1952, the LAFFEY fought the longest ship-to-shore artillery duel of the Korean war, suffering no casualties.

Following her return to Norfolk on 19 August 1952, the LAFFEY participated in Operation Springboard in the Carribean Sea before reporting to Philadelphia Naval Shipyard on 17 June 1953 for complete overhaul and alteration. After a short shakedown cruise in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, the LAFFEY was reported ready for sea, and assigned another tour of Far Eastern duty.

JAPAN




We arrived at the Canal as history was being made; the British had agreed to withdraw their troops. We missed the celebration, tho, because we passed through at night .
